

Lily began pursuing her business degree in 2019 and completed it in the fall of 2021. After completion, Clarion University accepted all of her earned credits

as a transfer student. She is now pursuing her bachelor's in business administration.

"NPRC has played a huge role in my successes. I graduated high school and did not have the means to go to college. A year later, I saw advertisements on Facebook for NPRC. I immediately reached out and scheduled classes. Fast forward two years, and I now have earned my associate degree in business administration. The flexibility offered by NPRC is the reason I was able to work full-time and go to school full-time. I worked all day and was able to attend classes at night. At most schools, you cannot take all necessary classes at night. Flexibility is just one of the many benefits NPRC has to offer to their students.

Another great thing about NPRC is the communication, dedication, and commitment of every single employee. At NPRC, you are not just a number. In fact, I felt like family to NPRC. My advisor reached out to me quite frequently to check on my progress and make sure I am doing well mentally and academically. At any point, day or night, I could also reach out to my advisor for guidance. My instructors were more than just instructors to me. They truly helped to guide me through the college experience and were always there to offer me life and career advice. My instructors and advisors played a huge role in my success at NPRC. I never felt like I did not have a person to contact when I was in need of assistance.

One of the biggest things that NPRC has done for me was getting all my credits transferred to continue with my education and earn a four-year degree. My advisor and the college staff never let me down through this process. We went through the process of sending numerous emails to Clarion and Edinboro and my advisor supported me and showed me how to advocate for myself. After lots of hard work to get my credits transferred, multiple colleges accepted every single credit. I ended up choosing Clarion to continue my education because of their fully online program, so I am still able to work full-time while completing my bachelor's degree. I am completely on track and now in my junior year of college."

Accreditation Update

NPRC's Accreditation Liaison Officer, Mindy Saunders, President Snelick, and Administrative Assistant, Joanna Elletson, continue to virtually meet with the College's MSCHE Vice President liaison. These meetings currently occur monthly to assist NPRC's team in its continued preparations for its impending site visit from the Commission. Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic and travel restrictions, the timing of the College's peer review visit is unknown. Additionally, various personnel continue to attend various virtual trainings offered by the Commission. In the upcoming month, NPRC staff members are scheduled to attend virtual training sessions such as "Identifying and Organizing Evidence for the Inventory" and From Assessment to Planning and Resource Allocation." To date, NPRC awaits feedback from submission of the College's September 2021 ARR – Update 1.

Student Services Team Update

The Community Engagement Specialists (CES) spent the winter and early spring months speaking at or scheduling-forward speaking engagements with a variety of municipalities. The team saw varying interest in both academic and workforce development offerings. The CES team continues follow-up with individual student leads in our student information system (SIS) and from marketing sources such as the chatbot and website inquiries. March/April activities will focus on tying-out municipality presentations and shifting to spring activities, including delivering summer/fall class schedules to instructional locations; conducting mock interviews; participating in career readiness fairs at high schools; coordinating library tours and visits; and scheduling spring/summer community events and speaking engagements with additional service organizations.
