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DEDICATION

Dr. Richard McDowell

Dr. Richard "Dick" McDowell is a man who can be described using many words. Tenacious, passionate, witty, driven, detailed, professional, and mentor are words peers and colleagues used when describing the Bradford native. At NPRC, we affectionately refer to Dr. McDowell as a trailblazer and friend.

Dr. McDowell made a career out of education as a student. professor, and later a higher education administrator. His roots are something that mean a great deal to him. Dr. McDowell grew up on School Street in Bradford, and what a forecast that would be for how he would spend much of his life. Education is one of his biggest passions, but aside from that, seeing people succeed and improve their lives is what he is most passionate about.

Dr. McDowell has made it his life's work to help others improve their lives, serving in many capacities to accomplish this. As a business owner, instructor, philanthropist, and later as president for the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford, board member for the Educational Consortium of the Upper Allegheny (ECUA), and board member for Northern Pennsylvania Regional College (NPRC), Dr. McDowell helped transform education in the Northern Tier.

He did this while also mentoring many business, education, and STEM professionals through his work. His impeccable memory recalls many conversations and lives that he interacted with, showing just how much time and interest he invested in others. His aura, both, demands respect, while also being the most personable individual in the room.

In his career at Pitt-Bradford, he led the campus's growth from satellite location to four-year institution. However, he knew in his heart something was still missing. There was a lack of affordable and accessible post-secondary education options for an overwhelming portion of regional residents.

After moving on from his post at Pitt-Bradford to become the President Emeritus, the next chapter of his career involved establishing a team to bring his vision of creating more affordable options for college hopefuls to life — an opportunity that is a true testament of his "big picture" thinking and understanding of the educational needs of our predominately rural area.

This innovative thought would connect not just college students in his native McKean County, but throughout the original 11 counties that the eventual Educational Consortium of the Upper Allegheny served by leveraging technology to create accessible higher education opportunities. Through campaigning, lobbying, recruiting, and planning, Dr. McDowell and his assembled team transformed a vision into a reality. Though there have been changes, including the ECUA evolving to become NPRC, these changes have only been expanded upon and helped his vision blossom into an impactful reality.

Today, Dr. McDowell remains one of the biggest supporters of education in the region, as well as of NPRC. He continues to support various philanthropic causes and small businesses in the area while residing in his hometown of Bradford. A true pioneer and one of many leaders who worked cooperatively to bring NPRC to fruition, Dr. McDowell's impact is something that will be felt for years to come.



At Northern Pennsylvania Regional College (NPRC), our communities' local resource for associate degrees, certificates, and workforce training, we do not see obstacles, only possibilities. Like the possibility of bringing affordable educational opportunities close to home.

The main priority of our institution is not just to lead our students towards a certificate or degree, but to lead them to careers that will positively impact their lives and create stronger communities.

We serve a nine-county region in northern Pennsylvania, where the average salary is \$49,000* a year. With that figure in mind, it is unfeasible for many potential students in our region to be able to afford \$24,000* (the average instate tuition for one year) in one academic school year. By providing affordable programs, offering institutional aid, and accepting local scholarships, NPRC eliminates the barrier of affordability, ensuring accessible educational opportunities to many where it was previously not possible.

Through our distance learning capabilities, where we combine live classroom instruction and leverage interactive technology, we provide educational access throughout the region we serve by meeting students where they are, within approximately 30 minutes of home, and at more than 20 instructional and workforce development locations. Our collaboration with integral community partners leads the charge to make this classroom experience possible without requiring our community members to leave the places where they live and work; the place they call home.

As an open-enrollment institution that requires only a high school diploma or its equivalent to apply, we create opportunities for those who may have never had the chance to sit in a college classroom before. NPRC educates, inspires, and serves our region in a way that is unique to its needs. We are more than a college; we are a second chance, a necessity, and an opportunity where learning and growth never stops.

AARON WEINKAUF is no stranger to the business world. The St. Marys native has owned and operated Weinkauf's Electric Guitars for over 13 years, while giving guitar lessons for many more. Starting in January of 2022, he decided to further his knowledge and skills in business by enrolling at NPRC. Eligible high school juniors and seniors can take dual enrollment classes at NPRC to get a jump start on their college education. NPRC has been working to create more opportunities for high school students through dual enrollment and prior learning credit agreements with local school districts. To provide additional access for high school students to take these courses, many options are available outside of school hours. To broaden this opportunity, NPRC will be piloting morning courses for the Fall 2022 term.

NPRC helps adult learners with affordable education that is typically outside of work hours. Whether they are looking to re-skill, increase employability, or had started college, but life circumstances prevented them from finishing, there is continued support to earn the goals set by individual students.

On November 4th, 2021, Northern Pennsylvania Regional College (NPRC) celebrated the RIBBON **CUTTING AND GRAND OPENING OF A NEW**

FACILITY IN ERIE CALLED THE EDUCATION AND TRAINING CENTER – Erie. This facility combines traditional classroom space with significant industry-specific laboratory space.

NPRC invested in equipment and building updates to allow students the opportunity to work with the most current technology used in our region's industries. Guests were welcomed from across NPRC's service area to learn more about this "very much-needed" facility, as described by Senator Dan Laughlin, 49th District. He continued to share that this facility "gets our young people, and even our adults that are trying to move up in the workforce, some of the training they need to advance in their life."

This location includes hands-on, state-of-the-art precision machining and industrial maintenance technology labs, an Early Childhood Education learning lab set up to model the classroom space early education teachers may work in, a science lab, a medical lab, and 14 general classrooms to be equipped with video technology. It is also serviced by two Erie bus routes.



ACADEMIC YEAR 2021-22



GENDER






FIRST TIME IN COLLEGE Self-reported on the NPRC application



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HR Business Partner from Niagara Cutter, LLC, **JUSTINE BOLAM**, contacted Northern Pennsylvania Regional College's Workforce Development Department to help create training programs for their employees in the areas of communication, change management, and delegation.


Niagara Cutter, LLC, a subsidiary of Seco Tools, LLC, has been a trusted provider of high-performance, high-value solid tooling to the aircraft, power generation, and general metalworking industries since 1954. Though the company got its start in the greater Buffalo, New York area, the business has been a staple in Jefferson County since the 1970s.

The core technologies of the business include application and design technology related to milling, machining, heat-treat, and grinding technology used to manufacture cutting tools, cleaning and tool preparation technology for cutting tools, and vacuum technology in PVD (physical vapor deposition) thin film coatings for cutting tools.

NPRC organized one training course per month for Niagara Cutter employees working specifically on the manufacturing floor. These courses were designed to help employees discover and implement new communication techniques and assist managers in knowing how to best delegate tasks within their department.

"The process from start to finish was easy and flowing," noted Bolam about working with the college. "It's just spectacular as far as whatever my needs were, they were met during negotiations. Everything that was said that would be done has been completed. Everyone who attended the training seems to think their communication skills have already improved."

Being located within one of the largest manufacturing hubs in the world, Northern Pennsylvania Regional College continues to seek new opportunities to benefit local and regional businesses. "This school is a great asset to the northern Pennsylvania region. I think NPRC is going to help a lot of employers through the Northern Tier."




SARAH FOSTER's journey at NPRC began in the fall of 2021 and in the spring of 2023, she will graduate with her associate degree in social sciences. A native of Warren, she graduated from Warren County Christian School and later enrolled in a four-year university.

In the spring semester of 2017, she returned home to Warren and entered the work force full-time. After working for a few years, she decided it was time to head back to school. The social sciences program was one that aligned with her long-term educational goals and will allow her to continue her education past her NPRC graduation later this school year.

"I heard about NPRC several times over the last few years through word of mouth. The main thing that sold me on NPRC was the ability to stay in my hometown and have the support systems that are often not present in online schools. Also, I work full-time, so the schedule at NPRC really helped facilitate my return to school."

Regarding her future career, Foster hopes to work in the non-profit or political advocacy space in a role that can help uplift the local community and make it an even greater place to live. "I am so happy to see NPRC close some of the educational gaps in northwestern Pennsylvania. Rural communities like mine deserve access to affordable, high-quality education. Mr. (Benjamin) Blood has been one of the best teachers I have ever had and has helped me become a better student and writer. He is an asset to NPRC."



MICHELLE BAWDEN is one dedicated woman — a mother of two, a wife, a full-time employee, a part-time basketball coach, and college student. Since January 2019, Bawden has found herself working long days as she works toward completing her degree in business administration.

A current employee in the Forest Area School District business office, she attends classes in the evenings and is currently enrolled in her final course.

"There were many semesters where I would leave my house at 7:30 a.m. and not return until well after 10:00 p.m. There's been a lot of long nights and weekends spent entirely on homework. None of it would have been possible without the help and support of my husband, parents, peers, and professors."

Being busy can sometimes be a good problem to have, especially when it is to give yourself and your family a better life. Michelle Bawden is an example of that and someone that hopes to encourage more people to go after the things they want in life.

"Who says you can't do it all? NPRC gave me the opportunity to conveniently and affordably 'have my cake and eat it too.' Their entire staff wants you to be successful and you can truly feel that in each correspondence, no matter which department you are communicating with."
