

# NPRC NOTEWORTHY NEWS



## RCCA AWARD

NPRC was named the recipient of the Rural Community College Alliance (RCCA) Workforce Development & Innovation Award. This national recognition highlights NPRC's efforts to address critical rural healthcare needs through targeted EMT training initiatives. The program offered low-cost or free-of-charge emergency medical services courses thanks to the generosity of local municipalities, public safety professionals, and organizations around the region. NPRC's commitment to accessible, affordable, and community-focused workforce training was noted by RCCA 'as a powerful model for rural-serving institutions nationwide.'

NPRC enabled 33 rural community members to become nationally certified EMTs, with more than 20 additional certifications possible as students who successfully completed the program have up to two years to test for their national certification.

The award was presented to Adam Johnson, NPRC's Vice President of Workforce Development, at the RCCA's 2025 Annual Conference held September 17 to 19 at East Central College in Union, Missouri. He shared, "I was incredibly proud to accept the Regional Community College Alliance Innovation in Workforce Award on behalf of NPRC. This recognition is a testament to the incredible dedication, creativity, and collaboration of the entire team who made this vision a reality."

## RURAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE ALLIANCE (RCCA) STUDENT SUCCESS ACADEMY

Northern Pennsylvania Regional College (NPRC) has been selected as a participant in the Rural Community College Alliance's (RCCA) inaugural Student Success Academy, a national opportunity available to its members. NPRC Vice Presidents, Dr. Ben Malczyk and Jennifer Cummings-Tutmaher, are joining colleagues from Highland Community College in Highland, Kansas for this grant-funded initiative.

NPRC is centering their project on creating affordable, sustainable, career-focused pathways for regional students in the field of primary and secondary education through the College's program for paraprofessionals.

"We are looking to be a part of the solution of providing quality educators for our schools," notes Cummings-Tutmaher. NPRC's Paraeducator Pathways Program allows working paraeducators throughout Pennsylvania to earn their teaching credentials while never leaving their communities and continuing to work at their jobs as paraeducators.

Paraprofessionals of all ages and backgrounds enroll in NPRC's associate degree in education studies and attend remotely. Upon graduation with their associate degree, they then can utilize NPRC's partnership with Wilson College, or other partners, to transfer and enroll in bachelor's degree programs in early childhood education and special education to earn a teaching credential. This partnership means that paraprofessionals can continue working at their jobs in school districts while earning the credentials to become teachers. In doing so, they will not have to leave their job or home.

"With NPRC's recent approval to participate in the federal financial aid program for students, we can help NPRC students earn an associate degree with little to no debt. This means earning a teaching degree isn't out of reach for people either physically or financially anymore," according to Cummings-Tutmaher.

NPRC is focusing efforts on establishing career pathways that connect degrees and work-ready certificates with real jobs in the local communities. The College's participation in the RCCA's Student Success Academy will result in a template for building out locally relevant, affordable Career and transfer pathways for all eight of NPRC's associate degrees.

This grant-funded opportunity began at the RCCA 2025 Annual Conference in September and will include interactive sessions throughout the year to ensure ongoing progress.

# RURAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE ALLIANCE (RCCA) FUND DEVELOPMENT ACADEMY

This program kicked off in September at the 2025 RCCA Annual Conference and will conclude at the 2026 annual conference. Advancement is important not just for the sustainability of the College, but also for the benefit of our learners for years to come. President Snelick and Jill will lead both public and industry-focused forums to develop our donor relations with industry and community leaders across the region in late spring of 2026. These forums will help inform others of the success of NPRC and the value our institution provides to the region. They will leave with a better understanding of how far their contributions towards the College could go and how to establish successful collaborations within the College.

Whether it is establishing scholarship pathways for employees or community members, donating to the College's emergency fund, supporting equipment and technology upgrades, or making any other type of meaningful gift, these community events will help to push NPRC's advancement efforts to the next level. Advancement Coordinator, Jill Lasecki, shared, "I am hopeful that by participating in this academy it will set up the Advancement Department to develop relationships with industries and community entities that we can collaborate with while also providing a donor base for the benefit of our students. I feel this will impact me as a professional by giving me the guidance and tools to make the Advancement Department a viable NPRC department and a champion for student scholarships."




## NEW CLASSROOM LOCATION IN WARREN

NPRC has officially added five classrooms at the Administrative Center, at 300 Second Avenue in Warren. Construction began on April 14 and wrapped up in October. Located on the third floor, these classrooms will provide spaces for students to attend classes and for instructors to teach from. The rooms will also serve as flexible areas for students to study, conduct meetings, and complete group work when they are not in use for class time.

The five classrooms combine to provide seating for 92 seats and will feature video conferencing technology, mobile tables and chairs, and Wi-Fi accessibility. These rooms will begin hosting academic courses at the beginning of the Spring 2026 term. NPRC will also use these rooms for community programming and workforce development courses. With college approval, these spaces will also be available for community use. These rooms can be the perfect place to host small meetings for local businesses and non-profits in Warren County.

# COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHTS

## SIX&KANE

Six&Kane is one of the many gems in Kane, Pennsylvania. This unique building certainly is unlike any other, not only in town, but throughout the Allegheny National Forest. The craftsmanship and commitment to sustainable energy practices make it one of a kind and a place NRPC is proud to call home in McKean County.

In 2019, the West Penn Energy Fund (WPEF), in collaboration with 63 North Fraley Street, LLC, purchased a vacant and decaying three-story commercial building on US Route 6 in Kane, Pa with the vision of transforming the building into an ultra-energy efficient building that would have positive economic benefit to Kane and the surrounding PA Wilds region. Hence, the name: Six&Kane. This building underwent an extensive three-year renovation to become the first Passive House EnerPHit Plus office building in North America. That renovation utilized mainly local trades and materials whenever and wherever possible as part of WPEF's mission. Originally built as a two-story brick building between 1897 and 1898, it was significantly refurbished thanks to the West Penn Energy Fund between 2019 and 2022. Today, NRPC occupies one of the second-floor spaces.

From the virtual reality programming series, to Day of Learning, to celebrating holiday cheer, and even hosting board and community meetings, this location has made a true difference for the College. But this is only the beginning of what it can offer. Project Manager for Six&Kane, Kristi Krott, shared, "To gather, to think, and to learn is the motto of Six&Kane. We strategically select tenants that embody that mission, and NRPC does exactly that. This is a space in a relaxed setting for learners and community members to enjoy. It allows for the perfect blend of hybrid education in a rural setting. We love having NRPC as a tenant and what they provide for the Kane community and beyond."

## AUSTIN AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Austin Area School District continues to stand out as one of NRPC's valued community and educational partners. The district has helped to enroll nearly 20 students in dual enrollment courses at no cost this school year. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors are taking advantage of the free college courses offered for high school students across the Commonwealth through the Summer 2027 term.

"NPRC has been an integral part of our community here in Austin for a few years and we are thankful to have added these resources for our high schoolers in terms of dual enrollment courses," noted School Counselor Carrie Burgett. "I've personally seen students gain confidence and realize that they are capable of doing well in college courses. Our district has invested two periods per day for students to complete their courses in and I know the College has invested in us by allowing these courses to be free, as well as their IT department helping us to get ready for these courses in less than two weeks' time."

Professionals employed in the district also have taken advantage of courses from NRPC. Before the start of the 2025-26 school year, all staff members completed CPR and first aid training led by Gregg Trisket and Rob Mosher from NRPC's public safety sector of the Workforce Development division. This training ensures employees are ready in case life-saving measures become necessary. "It was awesome for our whole staff to do this as a part of one of our in-service days. It was a very hands-on learning experience, and they were very patient with us to ensure we understood what was needed. Overall, it was a great training."

In addition to partnering with NRPC to provide opportunities for high school students and staff training, the Austin Area School District continues to be a long-standing community location for NRPC students to complete associate degrees and certificates in the evenings. For those seeking in-person higher education across Potter County, Austin remains a convenient and accessible place to take courses.

We are #NPRCProud of this fantastic partnership, and Austin Area Schools echo this excitement. "We are looking forward to growing our opportunities for students alongside NRPC. The team at NRPC is accessible and knowledgeable. I know more school districts will and should follow suit in building relationships with the College."
